



Syrus Marcus Ware

Syrus Marcus Ware is a Vanier scholar, visual artist, activist, curator and educator. Syrus uses drawing, installation and performance to explore social justice frameworks and Black activist culture, and he's shown widely in galleries and festivals across Canada. He is part of the Performance Disability Art Collective and a core-team member of Black Lives Matter-Toronto. He has won several recognitions including the TD Diversity Award 2017, "Best Queer Activist" NOW Magazine 2005, and the Steinert and Ferreiro Award 2012. He is the co-editor of the best-selling *Until We Are Free: Reflections on Black Lives Matter in Canada* (URP, 2020).

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Wendy Ng

Wendy Ng is an informal education specialist and advocate for equity and inclusion. As an immigrant and settler on occupied Indigenous lands, she has worked to change educational institutions from the inside out by holding space and building platforms for authentic voices historically marginalized from the narratives of museums and galleries. She has done so by implementing strategic plans, change management, and culture transformation initiatives throughout her career managing educational programming in large public institutions including the Ontario Science Centre, Royal Ontario Museum, and Art Gallery of Ontario. She presents regularly at national and international conferences and is a published author with a focus on social justice in museum education. Her museum career began with a paid position at the Science Museum in London, England and paid internships at the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum and National Gallery of Art in Washington, D.C. Wendy holds a MAT in Museum Education from George Washington University, a BFA and BEd from York University, and is a certified teacher in Ontario.



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
